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Overview:

Grade Level: Kindergarten

Theme: A Place Called Fredericton - Place and Community

Objective: Students will be able to define community in relation to themselves and others, the features of community and the area of

Fredericton, NB.

The theme of place and community will be introduced with resources provided in this toolkit which include storybooks, an art based lesson, a culminating lesson, and additional online resources. The topics of neighborhood, community helpers, relationships, history, family, and friends will be touched on throughout this toolkit. This toolkit also looks at the community closest to most students in this area which is the city of Fredericton, New Brunswick.

When students come to Kindergarten to learn more about the world around them they need to be taught to expand beyond their homes to the larger neighborhoods and communities that surround them. Therefore, when students participate in this unit they will explore the world around them as well as the importance of a community and how people are able to help their own community. Students will also be able to grasp the concept that they themselves are community helpers and can help the people around them. In addition to this, students will have a chance to explore different parts of a community and what that looks like over time.

Related to the curriculum outcomes for You and Your World, this unit will look at the specific features of a community, which include the people who live in it, historic landmarks, homes, along with other structures and establishments. This toolkit contains storybooks related to community, an art based lesson looking at the children's neighborhood in respect to Fredericton and the St. John River, and a culminating project of a community mural puzzle that is to be completed by the students over the course of the unit. As students learn about community and its features as time goes on, they will add puzzle pieces to a mural in the classroom demonstrating their understanding. Additional online resources are provided in this toolkit such as links to videos, websites, and songs related to the theme of place and community.



Franklin's Neighbourhood

Illustrated by Brenda Clark




In this children's storybook, Franklin is given the class project to create what he likes best about his neighbourhood. However, Franklin cannot decide what he wants to draw. His friends decide on the pond and the library, Franklin likes those places too. But what about the park? Or his house? After looking at all the places in his neighbourhood, Franklin decides that it is the people in his community that he likes best about his neighbourhood. This story looks at the community as a whole, including individuals in the community.

Outcomes:

Maybe Something Beautiful (How Art Transformed a Neighbourhood)

'In the heart of a gray city, there lived a girl who loved to doodle, colour, draw and paint'

When Mira sees the world, she sees a canvas and she spreads her love by drawing and making art for everyone in her neighbourhood. When Mira tapes her picture of a glowing sun, a man sees it and uses it as an inspiration.

The man begins to spread colour throughout the streets in the neighbourhood, creating beautiful murals and paintings. The man's efforts encourage other members of the community to create paintings and artwork. The walls, shops and benches are transformed with beautiful artwork. This children's book celebrates the power of community coming together and the potential that art has for transformation of a community and shows us that even a small group of individuals can affect change in a community. Arts-Based Lesson: Our Neighborhood



In this activity, students will represent their neighborhood in Fredericton. The water that the houses are reflected on represent the St. John River that separates the North and South side of Fredericton. They can have one house represent their family's home (could be an apartment, house, duplex, etc.). To adapt this for Kindergarten students, students will be given pre-cut shapes including windows, doors, short and tall houses/buildings.

Step 1: Draw a thick line in the middle of the page.

Step 2: Below the line, draw waves/ripples to represent water.

Step 3: Above the line, glue pre-cut shapes to make houses or apartment buildings.

Step 4: Glue doors, windows and roofs.

Step 5: Use watercolor paint to paint the reflection of houses in the water on the bottom half of the page.

Step 6: Use blue watercolor to paint around the reflections of the houses.

An alternative to this could be that students choose their favourite place in fredericton to represent. They could keep the reflection concept and draw that place above the line in the centre of the page.

Culminating Lesson: Building Our Community

Kindergarten's 'You and Your World' Unit 4 focuses on 'Place and Community'. This activity involves building a puzzle mural in the class that represents the different aspects of our community. Throughout the unit, we would read various books on community and do activities about what community means to each student, what you find in a community, the people who live there, etc. Day 1 of the activity would likely be an initial conversation about what community is. Each student will create a puzzle piece about themselves, their homes, their class, etc. to represent what community means to them. As we continue to learn about and expand upon community throughout various activities, we will add puzzle pieces to the class mural. For example, one day we could do a lesson on different jobs within the community such as, police officers, teachers, or firefighters.

As an extension, you could also have people from the community come into the class to talk about what they do for work! The next day, we may learn about buildings in our community, such as the grocery stores or movie theatres. This activity will be ongoing throughout the unit, continually growing as we learn new things. As a conclusion to the unit, we would likely review the puzzle mural and see the depth of our neighbourhoods and communities.





(Combination of these two activities).

On the World Map - Detailed Map of Fredericton

This is a large map of Fredericton. It shows streets, roads, rivers, buildings, hospitals, parking, shops, churches, schools, and parks in Fredericton. The map is detailed but simple and easy to read. This map could be put on the smartboard and the class can explore different areas of Fredericton and talk about what they have to offer (schools, churches, stores, parks, etc.). Another activity this online resource could facilitate in the classroom is the class could choose a destination and determine a route along the map from the school to that location. The maps on this website are printable as well so every student in the class could have a copy of their own map to look at. This website also has maps of other cities and areas as well that the class can explore as an extension.

Player FM Podcasts - Places and Travel



This website has a variety of podcasts about different places and travel stories from around the world. One in particular is about places to go on family vacation. To use this in a kindergarten classroom, you could have the students listen to a few episodes over a few days. Then, they could identify elements of the podcast that the people talked about (ex. Places to eat, fun things to do, etc.) and then create their own podcast as a class about Fredericton. Each student could choose one thing to talk about, and then you could record each of their parts separately. The end result would be a podcast by your class convincing others to take a family vacation to Fredericton. This could be a fun way to end the unit of community and place after learning about it through different activities.

This website covers safety tips for playing on the playground and using the equipment, and gives an outline of different guidelines that students should be aware of so that they can demonstrate safety within their community. Using this information, you could take your class for an outdoor walk around the school and playground, stopping at different areas to explain the safety rules for each area. As students become more comfortable with the rules, you could take them on another walk and have the students (in pairs or alone, whatever they prefer) explain to their classmates what safety rules apply to each area.

As an extension, you could videotape the students playing on the playground, and during class time play it back to them. The students can then point out when they see someone playing safely or fairly, and explain the safe behaviours that were demonstrated.
